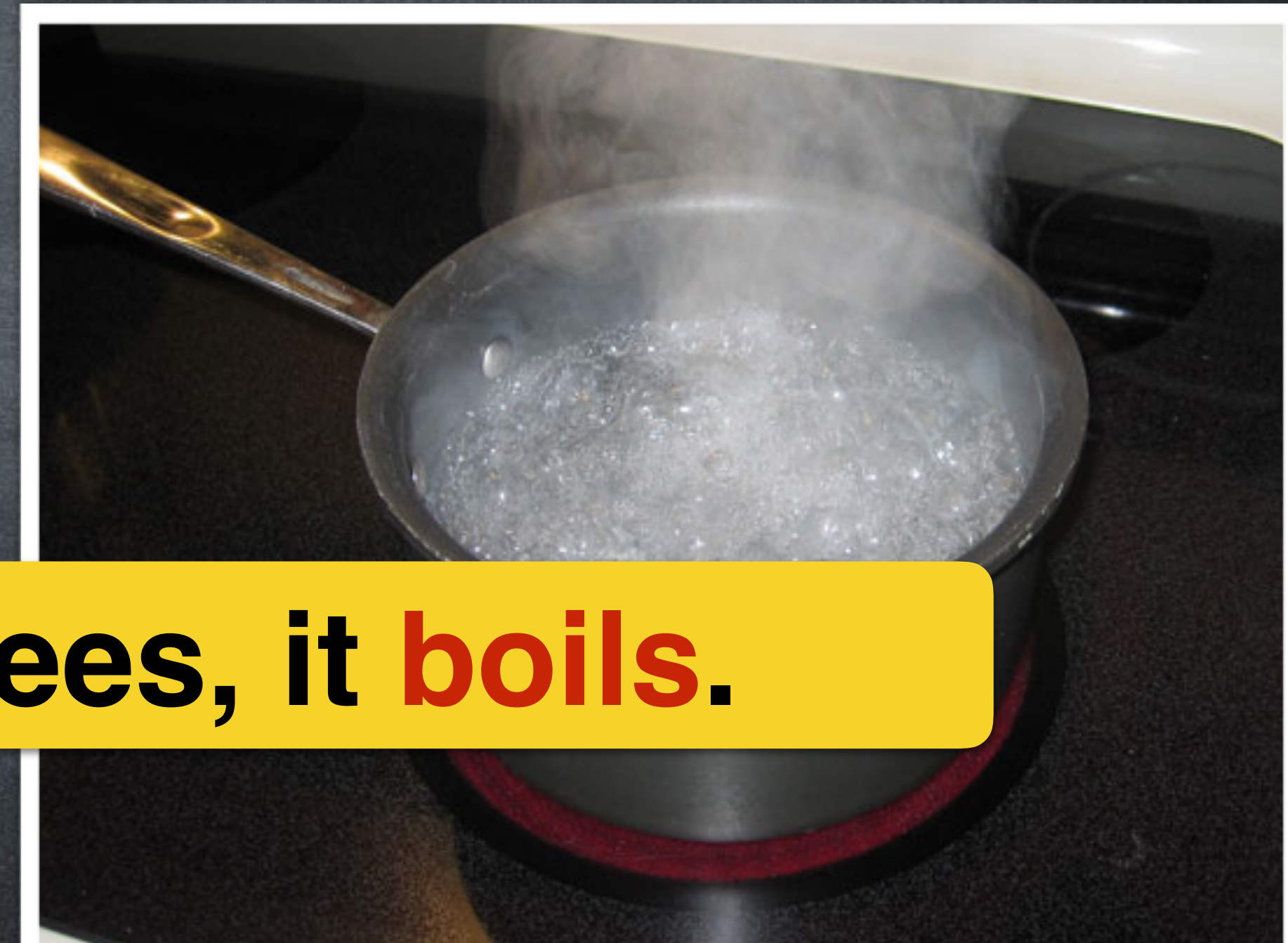

Conditional Type Zero

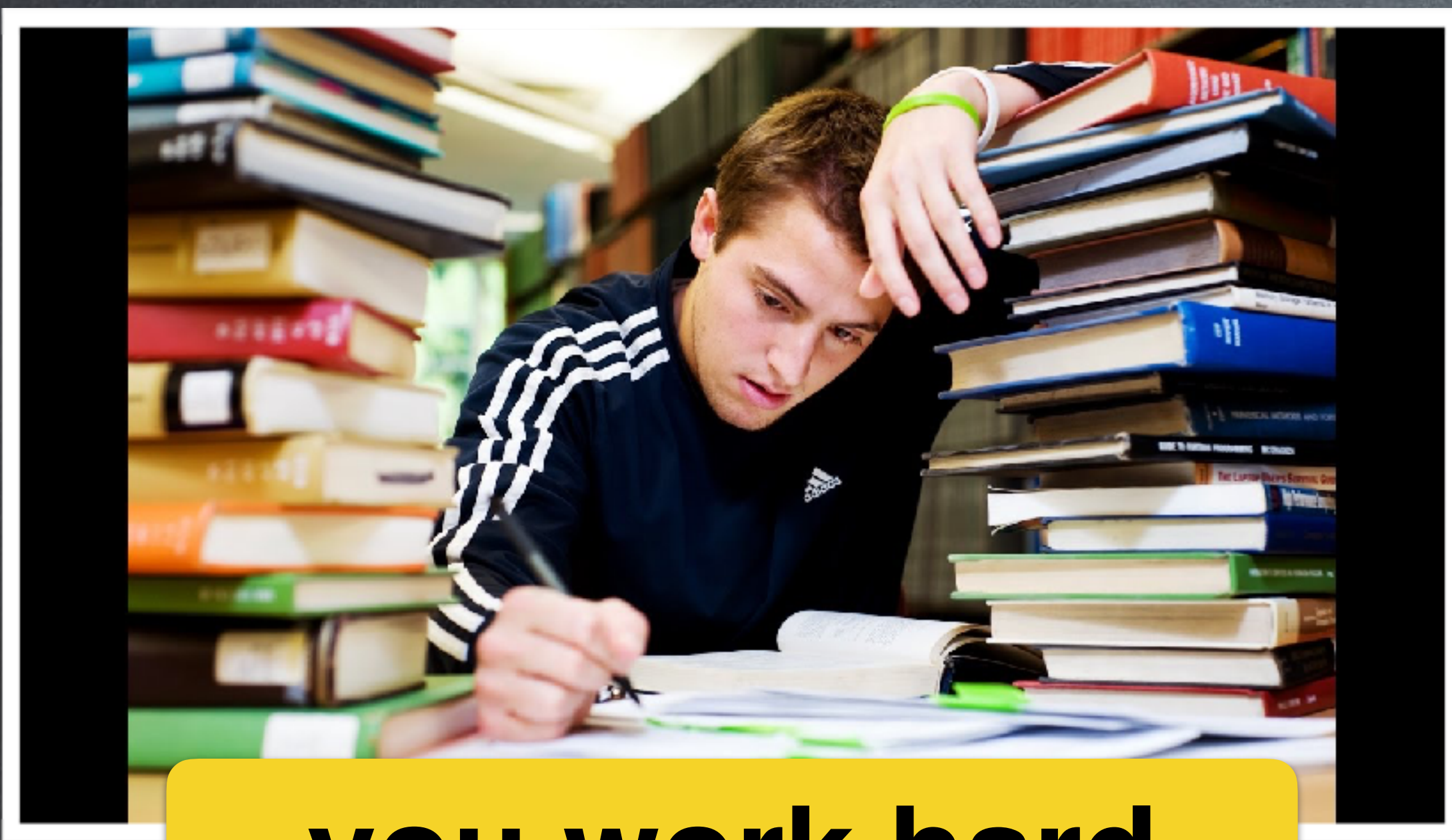
If you freeze water, it turns into ice.

If you heat water at 100 degrees, it boils.

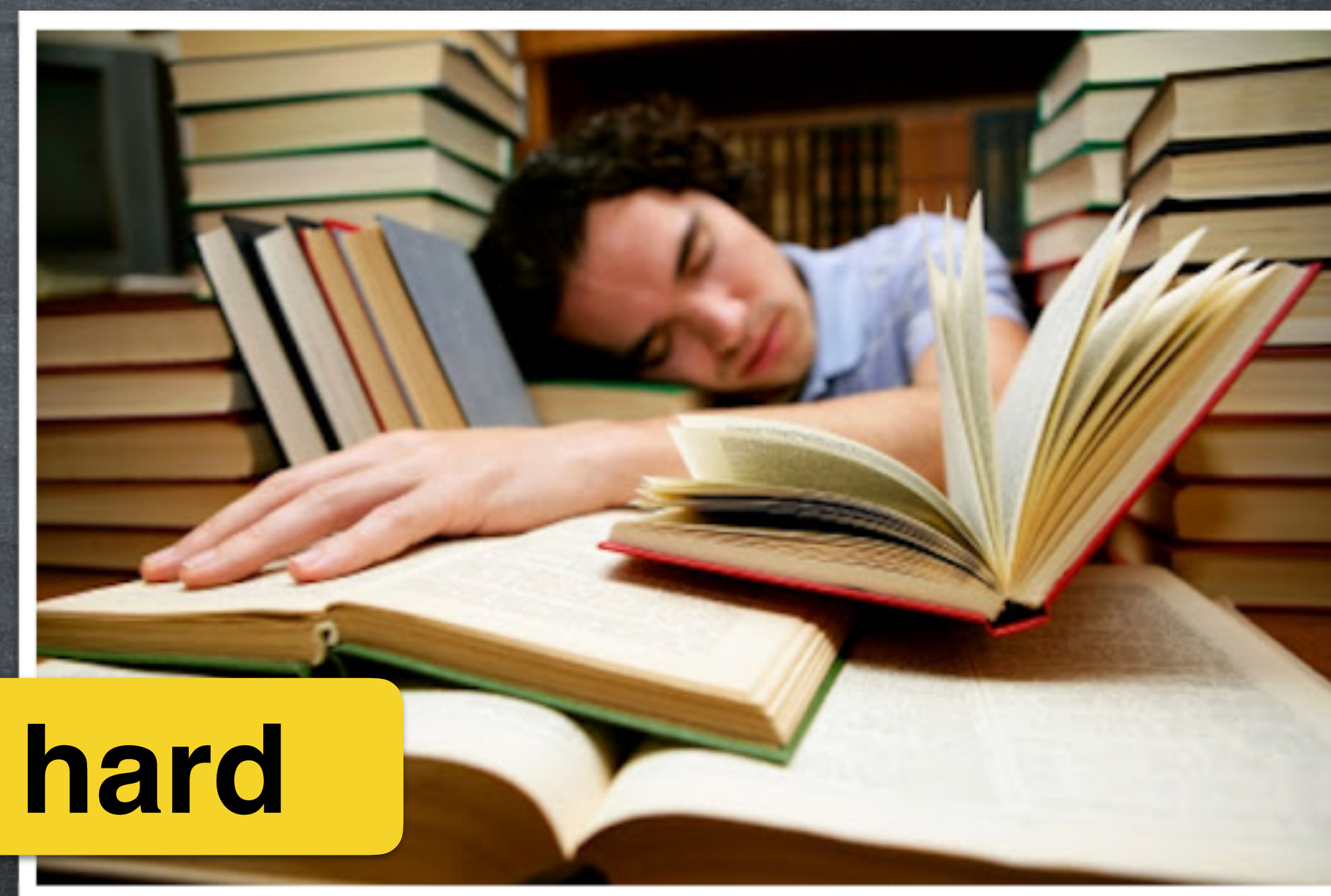
Use the zero conditional when we want to talk about facts or things that are generally true.

If + simple present + simple present

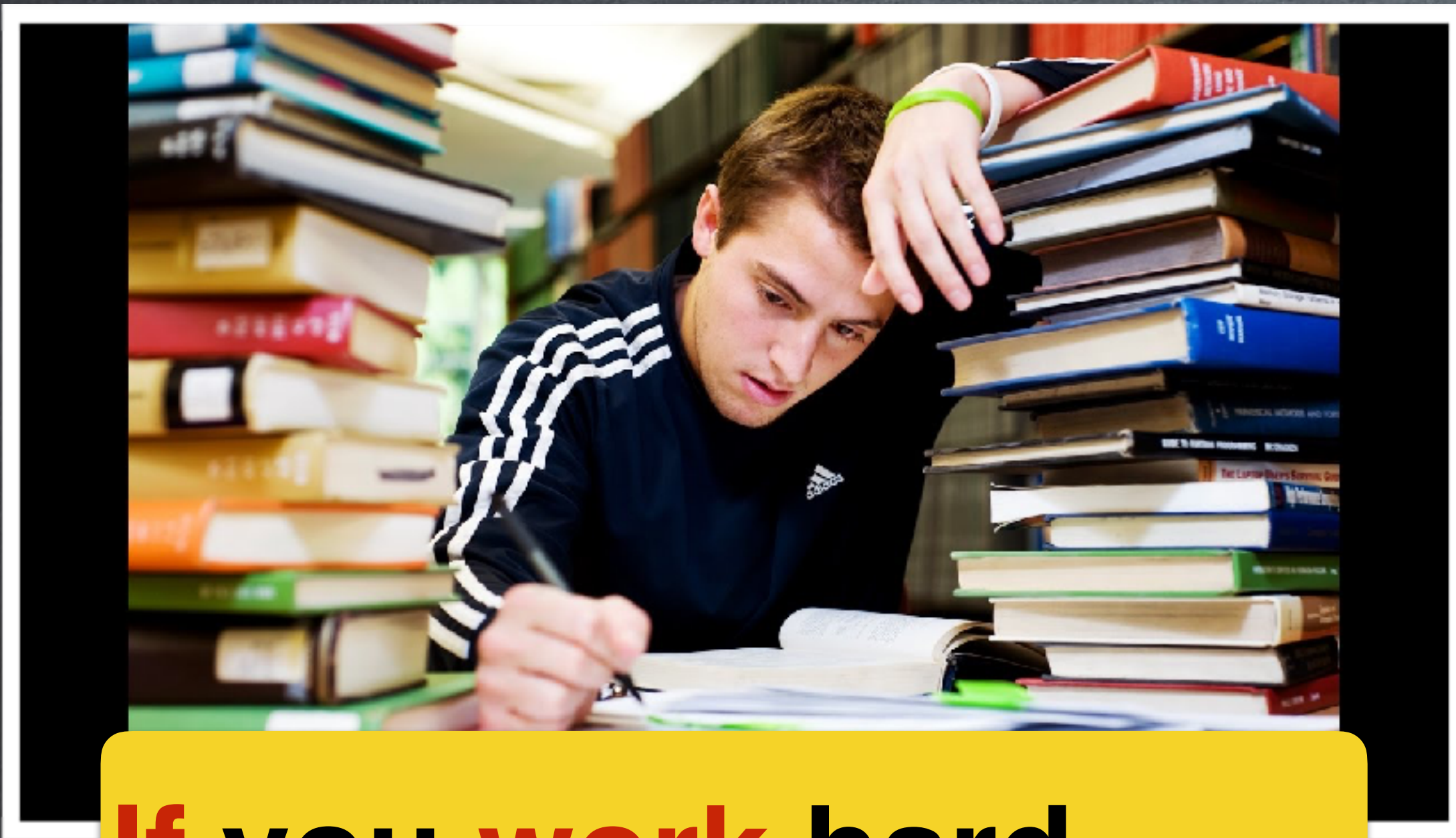


you work hard

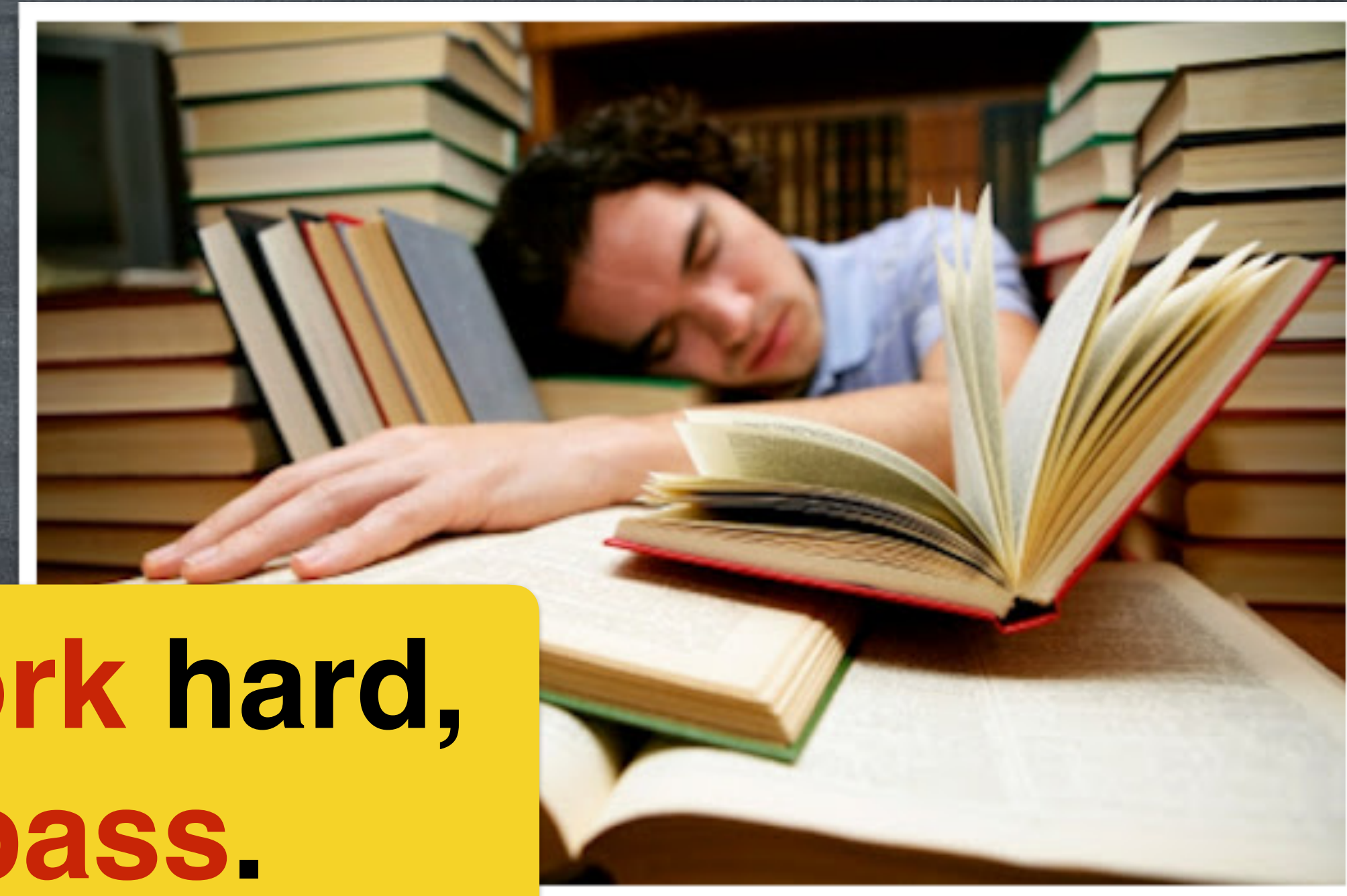


you don't work hard

**If you work hard,
you will pass.**



**If you don't work hard,
you won't pass.**

GRAMMAR: Conditionals

Conditional Type 1

If you work hard, you will pass.

If you don't work hard, you won't pass.

Use the conditional type 1 to refer to a possible condition and its probable result in the future.

If + simple present + future simple (will + verb)
