Reported Speech

Tom said that he liked ice cream.

GRAMMAR: The Reported Speech

Direct Speech	Reported Speech
"I <u>like</u> ice cream."	He said (that) he <u>liked</u> ice cream.
"I <u>am listening</u> to music <u>now</u> ."	He said (that) he <u>was listening</u> to music <u>then</u> .
"I <u>bought</u> a car <u>last week</u> ."	He said (that) he <u>had bought</u> a car <u>the week before</u> .
"I <u>was watching</u> a movie <u>yesterday</u> ."	He said (that) he <u>had been watching</u> a movie <u>the day before</u> .
"I <u>haven't seen</u> Julie."	He said (that) he <u>hadn't seen</u> Julie.
"I <u>had taken</u> English lessons <u>before</u> ."	He said (that) he <u>had taken</u> English lessons before.

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Direct Speech	Reported Speech
"I'll <u>come next week</u> ."	She said (that) she <u>would come the following week</u> .
"I <u>can speak</u> English."	She said (that) she <u>could speak</u> English.
"I <u>may come</u> later."	She said (that) she <u>might come</u> later.
"I <u>must study</u> for the exam."	She said (that) she <u>had to study</u> for the exam.
"I <u>could swim</u> when I was four."	She said (that) she <u>could swim</u> when she was four.
"I <u>should call</u> my mother."	She said (that) she <u>should call</u> her mother
"I <u>might</u> be late."	She said (that) she <u>might</u> be late.
"I <u>would help</u> , but.."	She said (that) she <u>would help</u> but...

GRAMMAR: The Reported Speech

Reported Speech with the imperative (commands)

Direct Order	Reported Order
"Go to bed!"	He told me <u>to go</u> to bed.
"Don't worry!"	He told me <u>not to worry</u> .
"Be on time!"	He told me <u>to be</u> on time.
"Don't smoke!"	He told me <u>not to smoke</u> .

GRAMMAR: The Reported Speech

Reported Speech with Wh-Questions

Direct Question	Reported Question
"Where is the post office, please?"	She asked me <u>where the post office was.</u>
"What are you doing?"	She asked me <u>what I was doing.</u>
"Who is that person?"	She asked me <u>who that person was.</u>

GRAMMAR: The Reported Speech

Reported Speech with Yes/No-Questions

Direct Question	Reported Question
"Do you like chocolate?"	He asked me <u>if I liked chocolate.</u>
"Have you ever been to Mexico?"	She asked me <u>if I had ever been to Mexico.</u>
"Are you listening to me?"	She asked me <u>if I was listening to her.</u>

Direct Speech - Simple Present	Reported Speech - Simple Past
am/is/are	was/were
play/plays	played
write/writes	wrote
don't/doesn't go	didn't go

GRAMMAR: The Reported Speech

Direct Speech - Simple Past	Reported Speech - Past Perfect
was/were	had been
played	had played
wrote	had written
didn't write	hadn't written

am/is/are playing

**Reported Speech -
Past Continuous**

was/were playing

**Direct Speech -
Present Perfect**

have/has played

**Reported Speech -
Past Perfect**

had played
